BURLINGTON COUNTY GOVERNMENT DURING THE REVOLUTION

Few of us realize how thoroughly disruptive the Revolution was for Burlington County. Settled by Quakers and Anglicans, neutrals and Tories outnumbered the county's patriots, making governing difficult during the conflict. The eastern townships, bordered by the Atlantic and the Mullica, were continually threatened by British navy raiding parties. The Western townships were invaded by Hessians in late 1776. During the winter of 1777-78, they fell under the guns of British warships in the Delaware and British forces seeking food and supplies. Clinton's army marched through them in June 1778. Paper money, long the primary medium of exchange, suffered disastrous inflation as the Confederation and the states tried paying for the war by printing money. (Sound familiar?) Among the results:

- The Freeholders (two each from the eleven townships) had trouble getting quorums, couldn't meet at all between June 1777 and March 1779, and were largely eclipsed by ad hoc revolutionary committees.
- The townships, which were responsible for collecting county taxes, fell into arrears. Not until 1790 did a committee of Freeholders provide a detailed report on how much each township owed, and since the sums owed were so large, recommended installment payments.

- Little Egg Harbor petitioned the state legislature to be excused from paying the war-time taxes it owed because neither Congress nor the state had protected it. The freeholders voted a counter-petition – the failures of state and nation shouldn't be paid for by the other Burlington County townships.
- In 1790, a Freeholder Board committee found that it's former tax collector, Thomas Fenimore, was using over £4,000 reimbursed to the county by the state as his own, and was even collecting interest on it. The County sued, and won a judgment against Fenimore for £1,340 plus costs. The U.S. had also sued him, and won £5,000 plus costs.

Fenimore deserves some sympathy. Almost every state and the Continental Congress printed its own money and Spanish, French, British and Dutch currency and coin also circulated. As did all other New Jersey businessmen, Fenimore not only had to keep track of inflation, but of the constantly fluctuating comparative values of maybe twenty or more media of exchange – without a computer or *The Wall Street Journal*!

On the final determination as to what each township owed the county for unpaid war-time taxes, Willingboro was found to have *overpaid* pounds “old state money”. Willingboro asked that the sum be credited to Springfield, which had underpaid. As a Willingboro resident, the author wonders whether Springfield ever paid us back.
